Feast of St Brigid Monday 1st February



February 1st is the feast of St. Brigid, patroness of Ireland. She was born in Cill Dara c 454. Ireland in Brigid's time was a patchwork of little kingdoms, half pagan, half Christian. Tradition tells us that Brigid wanted to enter a convent as a young girl but faced opposition from her father and brothers who would have preferred a marriage that would bring wealth and social status for this accomplished woman.

Brigid was to found a convent and church in Kildare that attained great importance and even vied for supremacy in contest to Armagh.

What can we learn from Brigid's life? What was her sanctity that so impressed her contemporaries and later generations who have venerated her in Ireland and in Europe and wherever the Irish have travelled?

Brigid drew her inspiration from one of the Beatitudes - the opening of Christ's sermon on the Mount 'Blessed are the merciful for they shall have mercy shown them'. She practised a self-sacrificing mercy to the poor and hungry. She gave away as much as she could - a merciful virgin who gained the title 'Muire na nGael' (Mary of the Gael') In Brigid's eyes the poor belonged to the great family whose Father was God. They were the needy brothers and sisters of Christ and while their bodies were being catered for the light and truth of Christ was to nourish their souls.

Brigid made an indelible deep mark throughout Ireland. Many holy wells and churches bear her name. many customs associated with the saint have come down to us. The most popular being the St. Brigid's cross, made from rushes and placed over the door of a house as a symbol of protection and blessing. Another custom associated with devotion to the saint is Brat Bride - that of placing a piece of cloth on the window cill on the eve of her feast, again invoking her protection. Traditional prayers in Irish are many. One of the most popular in Irish being:

- A Naomh Bríd a Mhuire na nGael, scar orainn do bhrat,
- A Naomh Bríd a chroí na féile, stiúir sinn ar an mbóthar ceart,
- A Naomh Bríd gheanúil ghrástúil, ar ár namhaid cosain sinn,
- A Naomh Bríd a bean rialta álainn, ar uair ár mbáis glaoigh orainn

Feast of St Blaise

The feast of St. Blaise takes place this Wednesday (Feb. 3rd). He was Bishop of Sebaste (present-day Turkey), and martyred in Armenia in 315 AD. Tradition tells us he was a physician before he became a bishop. Since the eighth century he has been venerated as patron of those who suffer from diseases of the throat. There is a story that he cured a young boy who was choking on a fishbone by holding blessed candles to his throat and praying over him.

In other years, we would normally welcome people for the blessing of throats. This year, however, we will be unable to do so. Instead, on Wednesday, after 10am Mass, we will offer a virtual blessing of throats via live-streaming. You are welcome to light a blessed candle (or any candle) in your home during this blessing and participate in spirit. The blessing of St. Blaise is a sign of our faith in God's protection and love for us and for the sick.
